

At this moment in time, we are unable to ascertain whether patients will be receiving the Pfizer-Biotech or Astra-Zeneca vaccinations as we are very much at the mercy of the higher

powers that be with regards to vaccination distribution and delivery.



We would like to emphasise the importance of following the government guidelines that are continue to be in place. Shingles vaccination

As well as the national vaccination campaign for Covid 19, there is a huge drive the get eligible people vaccinated against shingles. Shingles is a reactivation of chicken pox and causes a painful and sometimes itchy rash in a localised distribution with blistering. It can lead to a painful condition called post herpetic neuralgia after the rash has disappeared. Being vaccinated against this can prevent significant complications from shingles. We aim to have all 80 year olds vaccinated against Shingles and will be contacting eligible patients in the future for this.
